Creating Normalcy for Youth in Residential Settings

Background. Section III of the new federal statute, *Preventing Sex Trafficking and Strengthening Families Act of 2014* (PL 113-183), is designed to promote normalcy for children and youth in foster care, including those in child caring institutions. To a large extent, “normalcy” refers to providing youth with access to age-appropriate activities and experiences.

Conference goals focus on best practices related to creating normalcy for youth while they reside in residential treatment settings and to enhance staff’s ability to prepare youth for smooth transitions into home-based/community settings or independent living.

Dr. Larry Epstein is director of training and implementation at Think:Kids, assistant in psychology in the Department of Psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital, and clinical instructor in psychology in the Department of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Epstein has extensive experience utilizing and teaching

the Collaborative Problem Solving across a variety of settings including educational and clinical programs and outpatient practice.

For 17 years before joining Think:Kids, Dr. Epstein worked for the Cherry Creek School District in Denver, CO, during which time he helped develop the district's intensive treatment program for students with significant behavioral challenges. He is also a nationally certified bullying prevention trainer and helped found the nonprofit organization Creating Caring Communities. Dr. Epstein received his PhD in Child Clinical Psychology from the University of Denver and completed his internship at The Children's Hospital in Denver, CO.

Pamela E. Alexander, MUP, MSA, NCAC II, CADC, ICADC, is the program director at Ruth Ellis Center, an LGBTQ youth drop-in center and residential foster care home. Her professional career has encompassed

25+ years in the human services field and more specifically working with youth from at-risk homes. She has an extensive management background in program development and compliance, and she is credentialed in the field of substance use disorders at the state, national and international levels. Pamela is a dedicated leader and activist in the LGBTQ community in working to improve the rights of all LGBTQ people.



Jamiesha Benson, BA, has always had a passion for helping others, especially youth. Her passion to help others has led her to work in the human services field, where she has worked for 15 years, with 12 of the

years in residential child caring institutions. Jamiesha currently is residential director at Ruth Ellis Center where she feels rewarded in fulfilling her passion for helping others.



Trish Cocoros, BS, is co-executive director and co-founder of Youth Development Institute (YDI), a nonprofit, Joint Commission-accredited organization providing residential and outpatient behavioral health services for youth. Trish, together with her husband, David, founded YDI in October of 1996.

In June of 1997, YDI opened a 14-bed residential treatment unit in leased space and has since grown to a 132-bed continuum of care located on a 9-acre campus in central Phoenix. Trish has been the driving force behind YDI's goal to eliminate the use of seclusion and restraint and to implement trauma-informed care and Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT). Trish began her work with youth in residential treatment in 1970 and considers working directly with youth as the best part of her job.



Olivia Fink, LLMSW, family worker/therapist, has many years of clinical experience working with young people,

family members and parents where trauma and co-occurring disorders have resulted in highly challenging emotional dysregulation and disruptive behaviors. **Stephanie Muirhead**, LMSW, program manager, also has many years of clinical experience working with people who have experienced trauma and co-occurring disorders, as well as experience in staff training and clinical supervision. **Tom DuRussel-Weston**, LMSW, LMFT, director of training and QA, has over nine years of experience in application of Trauma Focused CBT in various settings such as residential, outpatient, independent living, and foster care. All three currently work at Holy Cross Children's Services.



Dr. Benjamin Kearney is executive vice president and chief clinical officer at OhioGuidestone. He is a dedicated advocate for clients' behavioral and mental health concerns and has provided a multitude of trainings on child and adolescent behavioral and mental health, many focused on quality of

life improvement within and beyond residential placement and treatment. Dr. Kearney is an adjunct professor at Cleveland State University and serves as a mental health consultant for both private and community mental health agencies throughout Ohio and Michigan. Dr. Kearney earned his bachelor's degree from Oberlin College and his doctorate from Cleveland State University.

Think Differently: A New Approach for Understanding and Helping Children with Challenging Behaviors

Dr. Larry Epstein

Challenging behavior has traditionally been thought of as willful and goal oriented, which has led to approaches that focus on motivating better behavior using reward and punishment programs. However, research over the last several decades demonstrates that for the majority of these youth, their challenges result from a lack of crucial thinking skills, such as problem solving, frustration tolerance, and flexibility. In this keynote, participants will have an opportunity to shift their perspective about these challenging youth, leading to more humane, compassionate and effective care.

Collaborative Problem Solving: Practical Strategies for Implementation

Dr. Larry Epstein

Building on the philosophy presented at the keynote that “Kids do well if they can,” this session will cover the basics of implementing the Collaborative Problem Solving Approach. The focus will be on helping children learn and strengthen crucial thinking skills, such as flexibility, frustration tolerance, and problem solving in the context of a helping relationship. Participants will learn specific strategies that they can take back to their sites and begin to utilize on Tuesday morning.

The Holy Grail of Eliminating Restraints

Trish Cocoros

Through the use of Six Core Strategies and a paradigm shift of eliminating—not just reducing—restraints, Youth Development Institute (YDI) achieved a significant reduction in the use of restraints—from an average of 37 per month to an average of fewer than one restraint per month. Although the quest for total elimination of restraints has proven as elusive as the Holy Grail, pursuing that goal has transformed YDI from an environment of conflict and stress into a truly therapeutic milieu in which safety and healing permeate the treatment culture. You will learn about the path taken by YDI and what they discovered in the process.

Necessity of Joy and Play for Youth in Residential Settings

Dr. Benjamin Kearney

This session will introduce participants to the basic elements of neurobiology. Imagine having an understanding of how the brain actually changes in positive environments and relationships that allow for self-expression and joy! The theory behind the value of joy and play for youth will be presented, specifically as they relate to youth in residential treatment and their transition to community placements. You will leave this session with activities and tools to incorporate into your own clinical practice and organization.

<p>The Sanctuary Model of Care addresses the way that trauma and chronic stress influence behavior. This session will explain the core components of the Sanctuary Model of Care. You will learn how to use and practice specific tools and techniques that reinforce the Sanctuary philosophy and how to implement Sanctuary within a residential treatment setting. The Sanctuary Model of Care is recognized as a best practice by the National Child Traumatic Stress Network and is accredited by the Council on Accreditation.</p>	<p>Limited research is available on what works most effectively for the LGBTQ runaway and homeless youth population. Ruth Ellis Center is at the forefront as a national leader in developing cutting-edge programs to meet the needs of this at-risk population. This session will focus on how “Ruth’s House” supports the needs of LGBTQ runaway and homeless youth in a residential setting. Emotional, mental and developmental needs are addressed through a unique approach that incorporates Ruth Ellis Center’s evidence-based practice model: Four Principles of Work: Harm Reduction, Restorative Justice, Trauma Informed Care, and Positive Youth Development.</p>	<p>Trauma Focused CBT has been recognized as the “gold standard” in working with young people who have experienced traumatic experiences and whose challenges include PTSD. The practice model of TF CBT points to several specific guidelines for engagement, psycho-education, and skills training for parents. Because young people in residential treatment receive daily support and guidance from residential staff, staff and parents need to be a team and implement similar methods to maximize consistency and healing relationships for young people. A particular challenge is responding to young persons’ emotional crises and related pain-based behaviors; trauma-informed crisis intervention is a key element. Consensus guidelines for Trauma Informed Parenting (TIP) and care from the National Traumatic Stress Network and SAMSHA will be included.</p>


